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
Beauty; of nature, of life, of human, of art, of landscape and of everything is what makes these entities pleasurable to the observer.

BEAUTY



Beauty is the aspect of objects that makes them gratifying to perceive. Beauty – having ugliness as it's opposing counterpart can be seen in different sectors of living and nonliving entities and these includes: landscapes, galaxies, humans, nature, and works of art, and art in its general form. Be informed that aesthetic pleasure will be incomplete without the reference of beauty as it makes up the third element of the triad that makes up the branch of philosophy; reducing this to the basest explanation, beauty, art, and taste makes up the Aesthetics.

Also, beside truth and goodness, beauty is one of the three fundamental concept of human sense of understanding.

In relation to concrete objects which are plain to the perception of senses, it is more often than not theorized that the beauty of a thing is always a function of the five senses, and the fathorned sixth one, so to say. But, it has also been unarguably proven that even abstract entities like love, art, faith and so on can also be perceived to be beautiful.

A look into a division of beauty by Immanuel Kant hold that beauty can be said to be dependent and free - further explaining the subjectivism judgment of beauty. He (Immanuel Kant) defined dependent beauty as one that depends on the conception or function of the entity being observed while free is towards the objective judgement and does not depend on the response of the perceiver, e.g. a painting of nature, with serene waters seeping down the accommodating slope of a rock and coagulating to form a mild aquarium blue pond at the base; with flowers that harmonizes with such arena gently nodding to the beat of

the wind; now imagine the visible description of nature rendered inglorious by a low quality painting.

OBJECTIVISM AND SUBJECTIVISM-THE JUDGMENT OF BEAUTY

Beauty's difficulty in understanding is as a result of it having subjective and objective facets. It according to the definition above is the property of things that makes them pleasing to perceive but it depends on the response of the observer. 'Beauty in the eyes of the beholder' is a quote set on the subjective part and the ability to perceive beauty or not is reffered to as the 'sense of taste'.

Judgement of beauty is somewhat based on the subjective more than the objective as the objectivism of beauty holds on to the traditional view whoose theory claims that beauty is an independent feature. While the subjective judgment is the most utilized judgement which is with reference to taste as discussed earlier.

Considering music and song as our specimens; music was for a long time unknown to the early man. But the chirping of birds, whisperings of airs, clapping of leaves and roars from the rushing of waters were things to listen to. In the modern world, music as a form of art is generally a wide field which is not just blissful and relaxing and a remedy for fatigue as most will say; it is a way of life for many. Howbeit, music can be without words, like a fly alone performance on musical instruments. As the definition portrays, music is anything pleasing to the hear, regardless of the language. On the other hand, song is usually reffered to as the lyrical note of a music. And it goes on being a song until accompanied by a musician who further increase the taste by the rhythms of the voice and musical instruments. Here, the minded reference to language is required, as it's meaningless if it's written in a language unknown to the reader.


Succinctly and conclusively, music is natural, while song is dependent. Thus, music is objective, and song, subjective.

The belle's braid dazzling the suitor


My eulogy is

Of the moonlit night




A SEASON IN THE SONNET'S SUN - Nattie O'Sheggzy

Interview Section - With Nattie O'Sheggzy

The beauty of art can never be over emphasized, such is the beauty of its agent as well. In this publication, we have also discovered a talent, a poet. There is only one way to connect with writers, and that's by reading them.

Interviewer - Who is Nattie O'Sheggzy?

Reply - My pen name is Nattie O'Sheggzy. To begin with, I am a Nigerian and I have been writing poetry for more than two decades. I started when I was in the secondary school. I love writing, and reading all sorts of books. I started with James Hadley Chase, Mills and Boom, etc. Those book opened my eyes to the power in the written words.

Interviewer - Nattie O'Sheggzy and poetry, what connects them?

Reply - I have tried to write other genre but I am more at home with poetry. Maybe it is because I am an introvert. Most authors are introverted, anyway. It's easier to weave words to have meanings. I enjoy it most when readers construe meanings than what I intended in my poems. The multiplicity of opinions and interpretations that can be read into poems keep me fascinated. Furthermore, the need to understand, or try to understand, what is running through the minds of poets when they right is an attraction that glued me to poetry over and above other genres that I write.

Interviewer - I've seen poets who chose nature as their source of inspiration, as in muse. You being an introvert, do you go out to hear birds chirps, or see the choreography in plants, or feel the touch of the wind? Simply, what do you derive inspiration from?

Reply - We are inspired differently, the goal of poetry seem to be universal. As early as I began to write, i accepted the fact that I had to follow Melpomene. I am inspired by the tragic and the melancholic. A friend pointed my attention to this while in the university. In his words: Why are you a melancholic writer? This made me to study my poems, and I agreed with him.

Interviewer - And what is poetry to you?

Reply - Poetry is a body of literary work in which the expression of feelings and ideas is given intensity by the use of distinctive style and rhythm. I have sarcastically written that poetry is a lazy attempt to write a lifetime's story in one page. Come to think of it poetry is simply the use of elegant words and rhythms to convey emotional feelings.



Interviewer - I've seen many a writer who put an abrupt end to their career by believing in the caging of academics. Do you study art or anything related to being a litterateur?

Yes? How did you go around and about it?

No? How did you go around and about it?

Reply - I never allowed myself to be caged by academics and work I didn't study literature. I studied Geography at the bachelor's level, and Surveying and Geoinformatics at postgraduate. While I school, you could only find me in the English Literature section of the library. What I did there is what everyone can guess. I always thank my father for the opportunity of reading Understanding the Unseen: An Introduction to English Poetry and the English Novel for Overseas Students by M.J. Murphy. I read the book over and over again. I am still with my dad's copy. I wonder if he ever remembers he has a book by that title with me. To be a good writer, you have to be a good reader.

Interviewer - The last line is it, but more of it we require. A word of advice for people struggling to break free from the caging.

Reply - I am not going to ask students to go burrow in the wrong section of the library like me. I think I will enjoin anyone torn between academics and literature to first and foremost understand himself. Set a goal between both possibilities. Take a step towards achieving your goals, and go for it with all your might like I did. Do you know I am not into surveying and any of the Earth sciences to earn a living. My work involves writing. It's a passion I cultivated while young. It's what I do with satisfaction to put food on the table. I am not a full-time writer, though. I believe anybody's passion can be what he relies on in the future. Never say never.

Interviewer - Something for poets out there.

Reply - True art can make us uncomfortable. It has to hurt to make us grow goosebumps. It has to transport us to the zenith and the abyss of life. Art needs to prick our conscience to dream, to spur us to act, and to make us take a step to change the world. Therefore, poets must not engage in poetry for its sake.

Reply - Africa is a continent resplendent with beauty but beset with greed. Talk of nature been benevolent. Talk of mineral resources. Talk of clement weather. But we make Mother Nature weep by our inability to turn all these natural endowments to a source of joy and abundance for the teeming population. Vinceremos! We shall overcome someday.

Interviewer - Africa and her interaction towards art in general, what can you say about that?

Reply - The disposition of Africans to arts generally is appalling. The saying, 'if you want to hide anything from Africans, put it in a book', rings true. Even African thieves do not steal money hidden inside books.

On a serious consideration, hungry people do not read. They go about looking for food to sustain them. You can only read, or write, when you are comfortable. Not many Africans are living comfortable lives. Things need to better in order to raise the standard of living on the African continent.

Interviewer - If you're to give a fiat that Africa in entity wouldn't say no to, what would it be?

Reply - Africans should say no to corruption. It we are able to achieve this as a continent, then all other things to make life bearable will fall in line.


